

Making the Most of Parent Teacher Conferences: Tips for Parents

BEFORE THE CONFERENCE

Talk with your student about school


- o Talk with your student before the conference to identify any areas of concern. You might want to tell your teen you'll be meeting with her/his teacher soon. Then you could ask questions such as ...
 - o What do you like most about the class/teacher?
 - o What do you like least about the class/teacher?
 - o What are your favorite subjects in school?
 - o What subjects are hardest for you?
 - o What do you think your teacher is going to tell me?
 - o Is there anything you think I should discuss with your teacher?
 - o Are you having any specific problems in the class?
 - If your student talks negatively about the class or teacher, remember you
 have only heard half of the story. Could your student be overreacting? Try
 not to overreact yourself; instead, plan on probing the other half of the story
 with the teacher.

Review your student's schoolwork

- Look over any progress reports, schoolwork, and any other communication you've received from the teacher.
- Try to identify areas of strength and weakness for your student regarding his/her schoolwork prior to the meeting. This can help you be able to better discuss your student's strengths as well as areas in need of improvement with his/her teacher.

Make a list of questions to ask the teacher

- Prepare a list of questions you want to ask your student's teacher; write them down so you don't forget them. List the most important ones first, in case time runs short. You might want to consider asking . . .
 - o What do you see as my student's strengths and weaknesses?
 - What are the skills and knowledge students in your class will be expected to master this year?
 - o How do you evaluate your students?
 - o Is my student working at grade level in math, reading, or writing? If not: What can I do to help? What school resources are available to help?
 - o Is my student doing the best s/he can?
 - o How has my student been doing with daily class work and homework?
 - o How has my student been doing on tests?
 - o What concerns do you have about my student?
 - o How is my teen's behavior in the classroom?
 - o What information can I share with you about my teen?
 - o I want to be involved in my student's education: how can we best work together?
 - o How can I best support my student's learning at home?

Partnership for Scientific Inquiry (PSI) Oregon Health & Science University (OHSU)

OHSU is an equal opportunity affirmative action institution.

PSI classes meet at OHSU on Mondays from 4:30-6:30pm during Spring semester. High school students gain first-hand knowledge of research methods and work to develop a research proposal. Classes are designed to teach effective scientific communication and inquiry skills. The course requires regular attendance and a significant time commitment outside of class. Each student will be paired with an OHSU faculty member as a mentor. Some students may also do a research project with their mentor over the summer if they are 16 or older in the summer. Applications are available on our website and due by January 6th, 2013.
